"He will be a tremendous asset to the board and the State of Illinois. *He brings a leadership style defined by the core Lasallian values of faith, service, community, and social justice that he learned as a De La Salle Institute student.* 

Tom is a leader who encourages others to share their opinions and expertise in helping to find solutions to daily challenges. He is focused on creating a rich high school experience complete with robust academic, spiritual, and athletic opportunities. - A *charitable gift annuity* allows for a life annuity for one or two lives, issued by De La Salle in exchange for gift or property with all of the assets of De La Salle guaranteeing the annuity payment to the annuitant(s) at the time of the gift. The donor increases income by consuming principal and earning over a lifetime.


#### **Meteors Unveil New Court**


The Class of 2021 graduation ceremony was held on Parente Field on a beautiful night. However, the contingency plan for inclement weather was to move the ceremony to the Parmer Activity Center (PAC). Fortunately, we did not need to retreat to the PAC because the weekend prior to the main event, the entire gym floor flooded resulting in a completely ruined hardwood floor, causing significant buckling issues in the two rubber floors, all due to a faulty valve.

#### "I was walking up to the PAC, and as you might imagine, I was shocked to notice a heavy stream of water flowing from under the northwest exterior doors," said Athletic Director Tom White. "I immediately called our Facility Director, Gino Bruno '77, and we began emergency recovery and restoration processes."

From an emergency crisis, we unveiled a new hardwood gym floor with new graphics that represent De La Salle's importance to the City of Chicago. As a centrally located Lasallian Catholic high school, we are fulfilling our mission to instill our values of faith, service, community, and social justice. The floor features the city skyline, school mascot, and Lasallian spirit, and a new and modern METEORS font graphic across center court, and the Signum Fidei artwork sitting above it all as a guiding star near the west sideline.

Although the project was unexpected, it required substantial amounts of manpower and resources that were not already accounted for in our budget. We found a way to get our Meteors back on the center court for both volleyball and basketball action. We're grateful to Stalker Sports for their expertise and installation of the new floor. # Loza Sisters Putting Up Big Points Through Field Goals

### **Girl Power with the Loza Sisters**

The story of two sisters playing football for the Meteors became a local media sensation after Mackenzie Capers '22 took a photograph of Mia Loza '23 clad in her football gear during the season's home opener.

That photo was shared on the school's social media accounts and was so popular that it went viral with over 20,000 organic impressions. The De La Salle Institute's football program has not one, but two female kickers, Mia and Sissi Loza '25, and they're sisters.

"I was debating if I should even post the photo to Instagram," said Mia. That's when her little sister, Sissi, chimed in to say, "I had to convince her that she should post the photo, and I even helped her write the

#### caption—'...started kicking goal kicks and ended up on the football team.'"

On a recent in-studio interview, Mia told NewsNation's Morning in America host Adrienne Bankert that she was managing the school's boys soccer team along with her sister when a coach noticed her ability to kick a soccer ball and suggested she try out for the boys' football kicking position.

"I was practicing with the mens soccer team after school, just going about my regular business, and Coach Michael Boehm '92 saw me, and he was like, "Let's try a field goal, see what you can do," Mia said. "So, we tried it out, and I made the field goal. He was impressed, and we kept doing it. He was like, "let's get you on the team."



Without hesitation, Mia joined the team. Meanwhile, Sissi was recruited to be on the mens junior varsity team.

"The next year, we went back in the summer, after having practiced for football, and together, we would practice our kicking," Sissi recalled. "Through this activity, Coach Boehm discovered me as well and said "You should be a kicker for JV."

Both sisters said they would be open to the idea of furthering their careers in collegiate sports.

"I feel like if we had the opportunity, I'd take it," Mia said. "I feel like it would be a big thing, not just for me, but for other girls, too, showing them that we are all capable of achieving our dreams." "I think we've inspired a lot of people," Sissi said. "Since we're girls playing on a football team, we're not only inspiring girls, but boys, too. I feel like if people see us, they can also know that they can do anything they want."

"They are an integral part of our football program," said Coach Boehm. "They are part of our collective Meteor family on and off the field. They are first and foremost great students, kind and humble young women, and stellar athletes. I couldn't be more proud of them."

Since the day of the photo that Capers took, Mia and Sissi have appeared live on ABC7 Chicago News, Windy City Weekend with Ryan Chiaverrini, NewsNation's Morning in America, Univision Noticias (national broadcast), Fox 32 Chicago, and on ABC World News Tonight with David Muir.

## Fall 2021 Meteor Athletics Highlights







The varsity team finished the season 21-10. As the #1 seed, they were victorious as champions of the IHSA 3A De La Salle Sectional. They finished their season against Nazareth in the Super Sectional. Of their 21 wins, they finished 1st in the De La Salle Tournament, 2nd in the Oak Lawn Spartan Classic, 3rd in the Reed-Custer Comet Classic, and 4th at the annual Chicago Christian Knight Invitational.

Senior captain, outside hitter Zoe Watts was named Most Valuable Player at the De La Salle Tournament and All-Tournament at the Oak Lawn Spartan Classic. Senior libero Madelyn Babuskow earned All-Tournament at the Chicago Christian Knight Invitational. Rounding out the All-Tournament honors for this season were Sophomore captain, Jennifer Falk (1st team) and Senior captain Amayah Jones (2nd team). Both are outside hitters.

Senior captains Amayah Jones and Zoe Watts were both named Girls Catholic Athletic Conference (GCAC) Red Division All-Conference. For Jones, this is her second time earning that honor.

The junior varsity and freshmen competed at the GCAC season ending tournaments on October 23 & 24th. The JV were seeded 9th while the freshmen were seeded 6th. The JV won the Palatine Invitational and finished 3rd at the Stevenson Invite and 4th at the prestigious Waubonsie Valley Tournament. The freshmen tournament highlight included a 2nd place at the Grayslake Central Invitational.



## **Mens Golf**

This year's team was young in nature but mature in years. They grew and developed their skills throughout the year showing improvements during the season. Freshmen Quinn Bell, Dawson Hickey, and Danny Kappel have shown a lot of skill and talent, as well as sophomore Joseph Simental. In addition, the team sent junior Jonah Powers to the second round of IHSA sectionals. In only his second year on the golf team, Jonah has quickly become the undeniable leader and role model for the younger players. Jonah's talent and quick rise has been a blessing and a very positive experience for him in his own development. The entire team looks forward to next season!

## **Womens Golf**

The womens team enjoyed one of its most successful seasons in De La Salle Institute's history. Building on the success of the previous seasons, the young women accomplished their very first win with a victory over St. Laurence. Led by sophomores Mia Liberti and Katie Connolly, the team consistently improved throughout the season, achieving a 6th place finish at the Girls Catholic Athletic Conference meet to finish the season. This team was also the largest team in recent memory, boasting a total of 18 golfers. The future looks bright for the program as all of the golfers will return next season. The team is made up of mostly freshmen and sophomores, along with four juniors. The team alternates practice sites among Harborside International Golf Course, Jackson Park, South Shore, and our home course, Meadows of Blue Island. Additional highlights include many golfers achieving their lowest scores of the season.





### **Womens Tennis**

The womens varsity tennis season culminated with strong showings at both the GCAC conference tournament as well as the IHSA sectionals in October. De La Salle placed 3rd overall at GCAC, with allconference awards going to sophomores Kamryn and Kennedy Porter- Champions at #1 Doubles, and junior Joanna Mullen- 2nd place at #2 Singles. At sectionals, the Porter sisters went in as the #5 seed and made it all the way to the 3rd round but lost to Latin in a state-determining match. It was their first loss of the entire season. Great season, Meteor tennis!

## **Womens Swimming**

The womens swim team is a mixture of new and experienced swimmers, captained by junior Daria Foster and senior Sofia Leanos. Newcomers on the rise include junior Sofia Podszus and sophomore Isabelle Lofgren. Throughout the year, the young women have beaten their personal best times. Freshman Sophia Acaxtenco finished the year off with a 34.49 in the 50-yard freestyle, junior Nora Sorensen finished with a personal best time of 1:16.74 in the 100-yard freestyle and junior Daria Foster finished with a personal best of 1:16.96 in the 100-yard freestyle. The team's last swim meet was at the UIC Sectional Meet.

## **Womens Cross Country**

Junior Keyaira Moore finished 74th in the state competition placing in the top 25% of all runners. Over the summer, the girls started coming in July for runs before starting the season. After putting in many miles, the young women, led by junior Keyaira Moore and senior Isabella Brogan, started competing in meets. The team took second place at the Bremen Invite in late September. As the season concluded, the two leaders, Keyaira and Izzy both qualified for the sectional meet with Moore advancing to state!



## **Mens Soccer**

The varsity soccer team ended with an overall record of 7-9-1 and placed second in conference play with a record of 3-2. The team consisted of 5 seniors, 5 juniors, and 7 freshmen (five of whom were starters). The young men were committed, dedicated, and determined throughout the season. Our seniors and juniors provided leadership and guidance. Our seven freshmen reinvigorated our team by their talent and work ethic on the field. The future looks bright, and we are looking forward to the upcoming years.





## **Mens Football**

Following the spring season due to Covid-19, the football team dawned their helmets and pads for a full fall season against a tough schedule. The team started strong and then went into Catholic League crossovers against some of the best. The Loza sisters generated a lot of energy around their abilities on the field and captured the attention of the local and national mediascape. The Meteors played a young squad and advanced to the Prep Bowl playoffs. We look forward to a great off season with a keen focus on building back a stronger 2022 team.

On a beautiful Friday evening in early October, we congratulated our honorees, especially the Classes of 1971 and 1996 on their Golden and Silver Jubilee Anniversaries. We also shared in the 75th Diamond Anniversary of the Class of 1946. As President Fr. Paul Novak remarked that evening, "We tip our hats to all of our anniversary classes, and I'm proud to say that De La Salle continues to positively impact the futures of the young women and men who are challenging their minds in our classrooms, growing stronger in their faith, and proving themselves fit on and off the fields and courts of play."

The honor key recipient this year was **Dr. Kirk A. Calhoun '71**. Each year, the Alumni Association awards an Honor Key to a graduate, faculty or staff member who has distinguished himself or herself by his or her impressive achievements at De La Salle or through civic or commercial success.

Dr. Calhoun is a highly regarded and decorated medical professional who finished his bachelor's degree in biology from the University of Illinois at Chicago and a medical degree from the University of Kansas School of Medicine. Following a residency in internal medicine at Northwestern University, he completed a fellowship in clinical nephrology, hypertension, and metabolism at the University of Chicago.





Following a very successful career in private practice, Dr. Calhoun aggressively pursued his passion in academic medicine. From 2002-2020, Dr. Calhoun served as President of The University of Texas Health Science Center at Tyler, during which time the campus grew significantly and became a SACSCOC accredited academic institution. In 2020, he was chosen as the president of the new consolidated UT Tyler, which merged the academic and health science campuses in Tyler.

"Even after all these years, De La Salle still feels like home," said Dr. Calhoun. "The Lasallian values of faith, service, and community still resonate with me in my professional and personal lives. The Christian Brothers held us to high personal and academic standards, of which I have no doubt, contributed to my personal success at college and in my career."

De La Salle's emphasis on academic innovation, ability to nurture students' appreciation for the arts, and cultivate positive athletic development all contributes to the student experience and exemplifies the true meaning of a Lasallian education. # Explore Your Investment Options: Support Future Generations of Meteors

You can use money from your IRA to donate to De La Salle Institute. What's more, your donation from a traditional IRA will be non-taxable since Congress and President Obama made that tax break permanent at the end of 2015.

#### Key Takeaways

- Funds from an individual retirement account (IRA) can be used for charitable donations.
- However, the tax break you get on your charitable donation cannot be combined with the tax break you get on your retirement savings. No double dipping!
- The IRS has established rules in order to ensure qualified charitable distributions QDCs are made properly.

#### How a Qualified Charitable Distribution from an IRA Works

Normally, when you take a distribution from a traditional IRA, you pay taxes on it since you didn't pay taxes on the money when you put it into your IRA, but if you are age 70½ or older and make a contribution directly from your traditional IRA to a qualified charity, you can donate up to \$100,000 without it being considered a taxable distribution. A donation to De La Salle must come from the required minimum distribution before you take your retirement allocation. To avoid paying taxes on the donation, you must follow the IRS's rules for qualified charitable distributions (QCDs), also called charitable IRA rollovers. De La Salle Institute is a qualified charity.

#### **QCDs and Required Minimum Distributions**

You can also use your qualified charitable donation to meet all or part of your IRA's required minimum distribution (RMD) for the year. Traditional IRA owners must start taking RMDs at age 70½ or face tax penalties. The charity must receive your donation by December 31 for you to apply it to that year's tax return. Roth IRAs do not require distributions while the account holder is alive.

Qualified charitable donations are also a good choice for individuals who otherwise could not deduct all or part of their charitable donations because of the IRS rule that says you cannot take a tax deduction for the amount of your donations that exceeds 60% of your adjusted gross income (AGI). At first glance, this rule might sound like it only affects wealthy taxpayers who give generously, but it also affects anyone who is retired and has little to no income but still wants to make a tax-deductible donation.

#### **Tax Filing Requirements**

Your IRA trustee will use IRS form 1099-R to report your qualified charitable distribution when you file your annual tax return. You will then report this information on form 1040. You should also keep your own records of the donation date, the account from which you made the donation, the amount you gave, and the charity you donated to in case there is any discrepancy. You also need a receipt from the charity stating that you did not receive any goods or services in exchange for your contribution. If you do, the amount of your donation is reduced by the value of the goods or services you received in exchange, and that part of your donation will be taxable.

#### The Bottom Line

Using your IRA to make a charitable donation can help you lower your tax bill and help De La Salle as long as it is a qualified 501(c)3 organization. Keep in mind, too, that distributions must be made directly to the charity, not to the owner or beneficiary. Your distribution check needs to be made payable to the De La Salle or it will be counted as taxable distributions. Another way to donate IRA assets to charity is through your estate after you pass away by naming the charity as the designated beneficiary of your IRA. The charity will receive whatever percentage of your IRA assets you provide for on the beneficiary form. Distributions from SIMPLE IRAs are not eligible to be qualified charitable donations.


